*TaCSA* – The Tanzanian Christian School Association was successfully launched in the first week of August with two back to back three day conferences; the first in Dar es Salaam and the second in Arusha. The keynote speaker, Dr Bev Norsworthy, of Bethlehem Tertiary Institute in New Zealand, presented five excellent sessions in each, talking about what “Education God’s Way” actually looks like. There were also many workshop sessions presented by Joshua Staff and friends! 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# Agriculture on the job

Our stable is well into the transition from piggery to rabbitry. We have been able to obtain larger rabbits from Kenya which have improved our breeding stock. We have also begun rabbit colonies instead of cages, providing them with a more natural environment. The long-term goal for this project is to be able to supply our colleges with low cost, high quality meat and to be able to provide micro loans (made available from the sale of the meat to restaurants and individuals) for rabbit projects in the villages. We also want to develop a Farming God's Way (FGW) program for rabbits. We have a few more stages to complete before these goals are achieved but we are well on our way!

Christian Missionary Fellowship in Tanzania contacted me regarding a group of 20 community leaders that were asking for assistance with ways to improve their harvests. They had very little rain in their area and obtained extremely meagre harvests. We put together a FGW

seminar for them. (As a reminder to those of you reading, FGW does not focus on agriculture. It first focuses on the complete paradigm change of the individual. No more throwing seeds out in the fields by the handfuls and leaving it all to chance; we teach them to be faithful with the things God has given them and to do everything wholeheartedly.) It was amazing during the seminar to see how God changed their old patterns of thinking and deposited peace and hope into their hearts. The leader of their group said that they will immediately begin implementing the FGW principles in their lives, farms and teaching the villages for which they are responsible in order to bring about restoration! Praise God!

During this disheartening harvesting time due to the drought, we have been blessed to hear how the individuals who implemented the principles of FGW have reaped amazing rewards! Philemon, who works with friends of ours, said that this harvest will be the largest he's

ever had! That is an amazing testimony to hear when his neighbours and family who planted a week before or after he did have NO harvest. We have several reports from different areas who are claiming that same thing! We serve a faithful God!

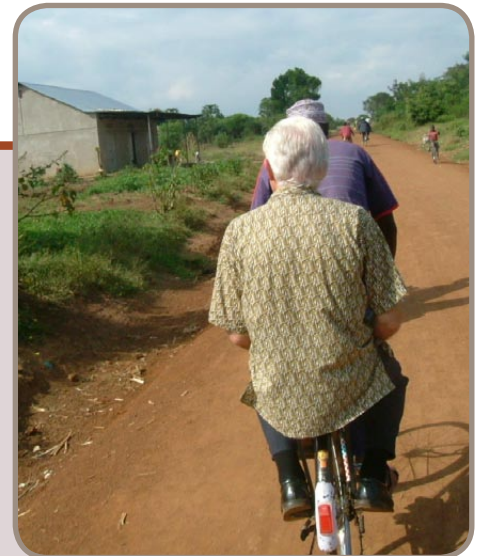
## JLMC LEADERS low-down

*Joshua Schools Magugu* – Allan and Sue Dow have been down in Magugu for a term now getting acquainted with the schools and their staff. They write:

“Sue’s focus on developing schools which will model high quality teaching and learning, and facilitate such teacher training relates directly to the situation we find ourselves in on a daily basis. We feel very privileged to be living in Magugu and doing this work. Ashleigh Tuck, a young artist from NZ now lives with us at En Gedi. Ashleigh will be helping at Magugu until December. Two more NZ teachers, Amy Shanks and Shelley Bishop, have also arrived and the education effort into Magugu increases!”

They continue, “We are right in the dry season in Magugu now:

- > Wells dot the dry river bed through town
- > Whirlwinds of dust are frequent
- > Water is delivered daily by tractor and trailer to school
- > ‘Salty’ water is sometimes used for cooking, cleaning and even drinking
- > Bicycles with buckets constantly ply the town

BUT we are pursuing a contract to put down a 100 metre well for the school! - We seem to live on the edge of dehydration day and night just now, and are constantly rehydrating with bottled

water purchased for about \$1 per litre.”

Please also be praying for our Standard Four class: this year will be the first year that a class in our primary school has sat examinations in English.

*Joshua Schools Arusha* – Celina and Teddy are doing a great job in our school here at En Gedi, teaching reading and writing, phonics and mathematics. The roll is expanding offering the extra challenge of getting new students up to speed with the rest of the class, but also helping with the school finances. At the beginning of August Teddy’s class (Pre-primary 2) moved into their new classroom built with two containers and materials supplied from the UK. This included new uniforms for all the children! It is starting to look like a really smart little school! But we are growing in other ways too... both Teddy and Celina are pregnant!

*Joshua Teachers Training College* – After much deliberation about the future of the college – despite having a superb course on offer – we have decided to change the nature of the course. It will now be conducted largely through a form of distance learning. Student teachers will be placed in schools where they will actively engage with what they are learning on a daily basis in the classrooms, being visited by JTTC staff members every two weeks to mentor them and monitor development. The current challenge is to get all of our current course material down into written form!
